#### **Crnamental Characteristics**

Size: Tree > 30 feet

Height: 50' - 80' (spread varies)

Leaves: Evergreen

Shape: pyramidal; oval in maturity

Ornamental Other:

#### **Environmental Characteristics**

Light: Full sun Hardy To Zone: 3a

Soil Ph: Can tolerate acid to neutral soil (pH 5.0 to 7.4)

Environmental Other: Full sun required. Grows best with excellent drainage.

Generally insect problems are not chronic; possible problems may include dieback, rusts, blights, canker, aphids and more

## Cultivars for Pinus resinosa

<b>Cultivar Name</b>	Notes
Aurea	'Aurea' - formal pyramidal form; needles are two-toned: bright greenish at the base, and golden-yellow at the tips; grows to 7' tall $x$ 3' wide in 10 years
Don Smith	'Don Smith' - dwarf and rounded habit; long green needles; red-brown stems; abundant cones which are colored purple when young
Fastigiata	`Fastigiata' - columnar form; grows to 10' x 2' in 10 years
Morel	'Morel' - globe-shaped habit; long, light-green needles; mid-size plants become dense, billowy shrubs that resemble the shape of morel mushrooms with rounded top-caps and more height than width
Quinobequin	'Quinobequin' - compact, dense bush becoming wider than high; grows up to 15 cm per year; dark green foliage; red-brown branches
Sandcastle	'Sandcastle' - dwarf, dense, upright shrub; tufts of short, dark-green needles; grows about 10 cm per year




